2. The Maritime Unit Group A, OSS, has served temporary duty with U.D.T. #10 from 25 June 1944 until the present date. Group A was organized November 1943 and was trained rigorously for six

months in California and in Nesseu in underwater eximing and demolition as well as general field training. All officers and men were volunteers, having been advised of the hazardous nature of the work which they were to undertake,

In time 1944, Group A was sent to OSS, Hombulu for duty.

The group was reassigned to temporary duty at Naval Combat Demolition and Training Base, Mani, T. H. where they were integrated with U.D.T. #10. Group A constituted practically the entire eximing complement of U.D.T. #10. These men were not only trained and conditioned extensively, but were expert swimmers at the time that they volunteered for Group A. Group A, attached to U.D.T. #10, participated at the Angeur, Ulithi, Leyte, Linguyen Gulf, and Zembales landings and one group of five OSS men participated in a special submarine bourne reconnaissance of Yap and Palen as noted below.

- 3. The itinerary of Maritime Unit Group A attached to U.D.T.
 #10 is as follows:
- (A) Training at Mani, T. H. from 26 June 1944 to 9 August 1944.

 During this training period emphasis was placed on team work in regard to blasting channels in coral reefs with the use of demolition charges.
- (B) August 10, 1944 U.D.T. team #10 boarded the USS Rathburne (APD 25) and proceeded to Purvis Bay, Solomon Islands where the Palen Islands operation was steered.
- (C) September 12, 1944 U.D.T. #10 commenced pre-assmilt work off Angour Island.
 - (D) On or about 17 September 1944 U.D.T. #10 in company with a

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 - (D) On or about 17 September 1944 U.D.T. #10 in company with a

small tesk force left the Palsu Islands for the Ulitzi Islands where pre-sessuit work was commenced in September 1954.

- (E) September 22, 1944 U.D.T. #10 abound the USS Nathburne left the Ulithi Islands and arrived at Names, Admiralty Islands about 25 September 1944 where the Leyta P.I. operation was being staged, U.D.T. #10 carried out a conditioning and training progress during the two week period they remained at Nazzas.
- "(F) On 18 October 1944 abound the USS Rathburne U.D.T. #10 arrived off Leyte, P.I. and commenced pre-assembly operations.
- (6) On 22 October 1944 aboard the USS Rathburne U.D.T. #10 left
 Leyte, P.I. and proceeded to Noumes, New Caledonia arriving there
 about November 11, 1944. U.D.T. #10 was sent ashore for a two week
 period of training and recreation. Team #10 departed from Noumes,
 New Caledonia aboard the USS Rathburne 26 November 1944 and proceeded to Hollandia, New Quines arriving there about 1 December 1944.
 Team #10 remained at Bollandia for approximately four weeks during
 which time a rigorous training and conditioning program was carried
 out.
- (H) U.D.T. #10 aboard the USS Hathburne left Hollandia on or about 25 December 1944 in company with units of the 7th Fleet and proceeded to Lingayen Gulf, Inzon, P.I. arriving there 6 January 1945.
- (I) On 7 Jamuary 1945 U.D.T. #10 commenced pre-assembly work at Lingayen Gulf. On or about 12 January 1945 U.D.T. #10 aboard the USS Rathburne departed from Lingayen Gulf and proceeded to Leyte Gulf arriving there on or about 18 January 1945.

- (J) U.D.T. #10 was chosen as the stand by team for further Philippine operations and was ordered to remain at Leyte Paif until

- for the Okinase operations.
- (M) Not having been called on for the Ckinama operations U.D.T. 10 was ordered aboard the USS Arenas (APA 128) on 4 April 1945 for transportation to Mani, T. H.
- (N) U.D.T. #10 arrived at Mani, T. H. on 16 April 1945 since which time a training and recreation program has been carried out. Team #10 is now waiting for orders sending them to the states for 30 days' leave and for several weeks training duty at Fort Pierce, Florida. Under the present plan Team \$10 will return to Mani on the

These sen were sent on a special extra hazardous mission the entire nature of which is unknown to se. However these sen operating from the Subsarine USS MUSTISH recommoditered at night beach approaches and shore installations of various islands in-cluding Palau, Yap and Truk.

Two of the above listed sen (BLACK, R. a. and Nackards, J.C.) failed to return to the USS BURGISH from a night operation off Yap Island. The remaining three sen (BARCHILL, L. L., CHRISTENSON, W. R. and MOORS, W. E.) were returned to Maui, T. H. where each was awarded the Silver Star. Since the completion of the above mentioned operations aboard the USS BURGISH the latter named sen have acted as swimming instructors at NCDT&2 Base, Maui, T. H. since their return in the late summer of 1944 until the present time. It is anticipated that these men will rejoin U.D.T. #10 before the latter group returns to the United States for leave and temporary duty.

The two men (BLACK, R. A. and MacMARON, J. C.) are listed as "missing in action" and to my knowledge no other status has been given these men by the Navy Department. The Health Records of these men are now in my possession and will be returned to OSS, Washington, D. C. for proper disposition.

OPERATIONS

The following is a very brief account of these operations:

ANGAUR ISLAND

U.D.T. #10 arrived off ANGALR ISLAND absent the USS a pre-assault reconnaissance of the tentatively planned landing beaches, ly heserious for the swimers who even up to the very water's edge. it was determined which beaches were most suited for apphibious into the beach locating the best areas for their landings. Also on D day, Team with searched and bouyed Mark IV type mines located about 200 yards off the beach where they were a menace to gun boats and larger landing craft. During the latter phase of the operation sharks were sighted by the sylumers adding another serious hazard to their job. One shark 6-8 feet long came within 10-15 yards of the swimmers, placing them in a perilous position until the Shark was driven off by gunners in the stand by L.C.P.R.

On D plus 1 and D plus 2 days, Team #10 was called upon to blast deeper channels in the coral reefs on the landing beaches so that the unloading of supplies from the larger craft such as LST's would be facilitated.

Rear Admiral D. E. Parbey complimented Team #10 for their work in the ANGATR landings.

ULITHI ISLAND

U.D.T. \$10 arrived off ULIDII ISLAM shoard the USS

Rathburne on 18 September 1944 and on D minus 2 days commenced preassembly recommissance of five beaches. These operations covered
a period of two days during which time complete hydrographic and
beach studies were made and reported to the admiral in charge of
the assembly forces. Description work was necessary on one beach which
consisted of blasting a channel to facilitate the amphibious landings on said beach.

U.D.T. 710 was sent a "well done" dispatch from the admiral in charge of landings.

LEYTE ISLAND

U.D.T. #10 arrived off LETTS ISLAND aboard the USS
Rathburne on 15 October 1944 and on D minus 1 day commenced preessent reconneissance of Red Beaches. Under extremely heavy mortar,
mechine gun, and sniper fire Team #10 made a complete study of the
beach by swimming up to the water's edge from which point a study
of beach installations was made. The report of these studies together with maps and recommendations to the assault commander were
an invaluable aid toward the successful completion of these landings.

Team #10 was sent a "well done" for their part in the operation by Vice Admiral J. B. Oldendorf.

LINGAYEN GULF

U.D.T. #10 arrived off LINGAYEN GUIF aboard the USS
Rathburne on 6 January 1945. The ships of the fire support unit

were attacked repeatedly by enemy middle places during the entire time spent in these waters.

The gamers of the USS Ratiburne were officially credited with the destruction of two enemy planes. Some of the ship's game were sammed by U.D.T. #10 personnel. One enemy plane was hit by gamers while making a suicide dive on the USS Ratiburne which resulted in the plane losing control and creating into the unter approximately 50 feet aft of the ship's factall.

On D mimis 2 days U.D.T. #10 cosmenced pre-essent reconnsistence of beaches from which U.D.T. #10 was able to turn in accurate reports and maps of beaches reconnsistered. U.D.T. #10 ande a post-assemble search of suitable landing beaches for LST's which facilitated the unloading of supplies. U.D.T. #10 received a "well done" dispatch from Vice Admiral J. B. Clendorf for work done at LINCAYES GUIF.

ZAMBALES LUZON

Rathburne on the night of 29 January 1945. Without fire support U.D.T. #10 made a sneak night reconnaissance of the beaches at ZAMBALES. In order to get as such information as possible team members risked the basards of infiltrating to the beaches to check on enemy installations and strength. No enemy activity was observed and U.D.T. #10's report, in part at least, influenced the amphibious command to dispense with the usual pre-essault bombardment obvicting the loss of many native lives and the destruction of their villages. The amphibious landings were unopposed.

MISCHLARMOUS COMMENTS ON OSS MARITIMS UNIT, GROUP A. ATTACHED TO U.D.T. #10

PERSONNEL

OSS Maritime Unit personnel made up approximately one third the total personnel attached to U.D.T. #10. Included in this group were 5 officers and 24 enlisted men all of whome assumed key positions in U.D.T. #10. The positions held by the OSS Maritime Unit officers are as follows:

Lt. Choate, UEER, the commanding officer of Maritime Unit. Group A, was placed in command U.D.T. #10 which command he holds to the present date.

Lt. Knott, USUR, the executive officer of Maritime Unit, Group A, was designated as the executive officer of U.D.T. #10 which position he held until early March 1945 at which time he returned to Mashington, D. C. under orders.

Lt. Gibboney, USUR, the medical officer attached to Maritime Unit, Group A, was designated as the medical officer of U.D.T. #10 which position he held until 16 May 1985 at which time he was detached from U.D.T. #10 to return to OSS washington, D. C.

let. Lt. Wolfe, USA, was designated as the intelligence officer attached to U.D.T. \$10 which position he held until early March 1945 at which time he returned to Washington, D. C. under orders.

Ensign Garrett, USCGR, was designated as the platoon leader of Platoon #1 U.D.T. #10 which position he holds to this date.

on temporary duty with U.D.T. \$10 likewise were given key positions in U.D.T. \$10 making up nearly the entire swimming complement of the teem. Five of these men were chosen to go on a special mission abound the Subsarine USS MEGISH. Two of the five men are missing in action.

The OSS personnel attached to U.D.T. #10 did an excellent job both during the period of training and in operations and were largely responsible for the successful operations undertaken by U.D.T. #10.

That the OSS personnel attached to U.D.T. #10 were superior swimmers to other demolition personnel supplied by the Navy from Fort Pierce is bourne out by the fact that OSS men were assigned as swimming instructors for all of the demolition base team personnel and consequently these OSS men have trained over a thousand U.D.T. Navy personnel.

COMMENTS BY ADVIDAL CHESTER W. NIMITZ

When sent ashore at Guam U.D.T. #10 was instructed to build their own camp. On inspecting the camp and the personnel attached to U.D.T. #10, Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz praised U.D.T. #10 highly stating that they were the best appearing sallors on the Island of Guam, Admiral Nimitz also commended U.D.T. #10 for the good work they had done in their previous operations.

TRAINING

Maritime Unit, Group A, were trained extensively for 6

Months in all types of water work both on the water's surface and under water. In addition to this a complete course in desplition work and field training was coursed out.

band, had less than two month's training nearly all of which time was spent on demolition work.

apre carefully selected group toth physically and mentally. Conecquently the responsibility for training U.D.T. #10 as a unit rested on OSS personnel. Only in demolition work did the Navy demolition personnel compare favorably with the OSS personnel.

The Maritime Unit was equipped for independent operations both in the water and on land. Most of this equipment was not practical for U.D.T. operations and is in storage at MCDT&E Base, Mani, T. H. The advantages of swim fine in carrying out swimming operations were shown by the CSS Maritime Group. Swim fines are now used by all havy Demolition Teams and have increased the efficiency of the teams tremendously.

MEDICAL REPORT

A medical survey of all U.D.T. v10 personnel while in POA has been prepared by Lt. L. J. Gibboney, M. C., USNR, and will be turned over to Colonel Sylvester C. Missal by Dr. Gibboney on his arrival in Washington, D. C. This report has already been forwarded to BuMed via AdComPhibePac by Lt. Choate.
